Meeting with Suppliers & Producers in Kandy District



"Meet the Suppliers/Producers in Kandy District" program organized by the Industrial Development Board Kandy District Office was held on 22nd March 2023, with the participation of 60-65 producers from Multi-Sectors, and the Chamber was invited to join them in creating a platform between exporters and producers. NCE led a group of 15 people from 07 exporting and service-providing companies to Kandy for the event.

This event was organized with the objective of offering opportunities for these producers to become indirect exporters by supplying their products to the exporters, as well as providing Chamber assistance by industry exporters sharing their experience and identifying industrialist issues and development needs, and assisting these producers to solve those problems.

NCE conducted the latest online course on Preventative Controls Qualified Individual (PCQI),




The NCE conducted the latest online course on Preventative Controls Qualified Individual (PCQI), from 27th, 28th and 30th March 2023, under partnership with Hatton National Bank PLC(HNB). The participants who completed the 03-day course will be certified as US Food and Drug Administration (FDA) qualified individuals. This will facilitate their respective organizations to export to the US food and beverage market effectively.

On successful completion of this FDA-approved standardized curriculum, participants received a Food Safety Preventive Controls Alliance (FSPCA) PCQI certificate recognized by the FDA and issued by the Association of Food and Drug Officials (AFDO) and the International Food Protection Training Institute. Fulfilling the requirements to be a PCQI is a critical step in exporting food and beverages to the United States. This programe was conducted by Kemasorooby Vasenth, a certified instructor in Preventive Controls for Human Food. This course is aimed at exporters seeking to meet the training requirements for the PCQI.



CEYLON COFFEE

offee trees are pruned short to conserve their energy and aid in harvesting but can grow to more than 30 feet (9 meters) high. Each tree is covered with green, waxy leaves growing opposite each other in pairs. Coffee cherries grow along the branches. Because it grows in a continuous cycle, it's not unusual to see flowers, green fruit, and ripe fruit simultaneously on a single tree. It takes nearly a year for a cherry to mature after first flowering, and about 5 years of growth to reach full fruit production. While coffee plants can live up to 100 years, they are generally the most productive between the ages of 7 and 20. Proper care can maintain and even increase their output over the years, depending on the variety. The average coffee tree produces 10 pounds of coffee cherry per year or 2 pounds of green beans. All commercially grown coffee is from a region of the world called the Coffee Belt. The trees grow best in rich soil, with mild temperatures, frequent rain, and shaded sun

In the year 1503 Arabians introduced coffee to Sri Lanka. In old days Sri Lanka exported nearly 50 000 tons of coffee per year. But due to a severe disease called coffee rust that occurred in 1870 coffee cultivation was destroyed. Coffee cultivations were replaced by rubber and tea lately. Therefore nearly 600 tons of coffee per year have been imported. After introducing rust-tolerant Arabica varieties and hybrid coffee cultivations become popular again.

Arabica-type coffee prefers wet and intermediate zones which have an elevation above 800m. mostly grown areas are Nuwara Eliya, Kandy, Matale, and Badulla. Robusta-type coffee prefers elevation lower than 800m. robusta is mainly grown in Kegalle, Kurunegala, Kandy, and Matale. The total extent of coffee cultivation is about 60580 ha.

Coffee belongs to the family Rubiaceae. It has about 60 varieties. Among them, Arabica and Robusta are economically important. Liberica coffee is not commercially grown in Sri Lanka.

• Arabica coffee (Coffea Arabica)

Arabica coffee has Ethiopian origins. Cool climates with higher (more than 800m) elevations are suitable for cultivation. Easy to manage as trees are smaller. 1kg of processed coffee can be produced with 5 kg of raw coffee. Arabica is self-pollinated. Therefore seed propagation can be done. Due to the high-quality flavor and aroma, Arabica coffee has a higher price in the market. HTD, S09, Catimur, Lakparakum, Lak Saviru, and Lak Komali are high-yielding coffee varieties. While some are resistant to coffee rust.

• Robusta coffee (Coffea canephora)

Has an African origin. Can be cultivated up to 800m in elevation in wet and intermediate zones. 1kg of processed coffee can be produced with 4.5 to 5 kg of row coffee. Newly released varieties are IMY, S274, GCR, CCI, Lanka Chandra, Lanka Bimsara, and Lanka Isuru.

Liberica coffee

Has large trees. Not grown at commercial level. Coffee has a bitter taste. However, there is a demand in Malaysia and Middle East countries.
